ESA Transition Report

Updates on the transfer of case management to DHHS

February 28, 2022

ransition of Eastern Service Area (ESA) case management continues on schedule, with all case staffings completed by the end of February 2022. Through January and February, caseworkers from the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), Saint Francis Ministries (SFM) and numerous stakeholders staffed cases for more than 1,600 youth in the ESA. DHHS thanks system partners for participation and support in helping ensure the children and families in the ESA receive the services they need, when they need them.

Since the transition began, DHHS has welcomed more than 80 new teammates who transferred from SFM. Caseworker and casework supervisor transfers will continue through March; administrative and support staff will transfer in March and April. DHHS plans to transfer more than 190 teammates from SFM by the middle of May 2022.

The success of the ESA transition would not be possible without the care and commitment of hundreds of social workers. March is Social Work Month, and the National Association of Social Workers has proclaimed the 2022 theme "The Time Is Right for Social Work." As teammates continue to transition from SFM to DHHS, Administrators will continue to ensure caseworkers receive high-quality training and support so families and children receive the care and services they need to be well.

Prior to the transition of cases to DHHS, the Department was responsible for investigating reports of abuse or neglect in the ESA through the Internal Assessment (IA) team. Management of in-home and out-of-home cases was handled by SFM. DHHS calls this work Ongoing case management. The transition of cases required establishing a new, larger ESA leadership team under the direction of Service Area Administrator Lana Verbrigghe.
